III. Collective Impact Core Updates

Clint

A. Core Concept - [The Impact of Trauma on Adult Behavior](#)

Clint

Repeated exposure to traumatic events, especially in childhood, can impact the way the brain develops.

Adults whose brains have developed through trauma may spend more time responding from a place of either hyper- (anxious, angry, overwhelmed) or hypo- (spacey, numb, depressed) arousal.

Trauma can also impact the neural pathways involved in:

- Memory function
- Problem solving
- Decision making

Neural pathways have the ability to change over the lifespan, so the impacts of trauma can be “re-wired” through intervention.

Take it further in your own work by:

- Practicing the [Community Resilience Model's Help Now strategies](#) to ground yourself when feeling hyper- or hypo-aroused.
- Building [activities](#) that help “re-wire” neural pathways into your meeting agendas.

B. State Behavioral Health Legislative Proposals

Everyone is encouraged to share the talking points regarding Michigan Senate Bills 597 & 598 with their local legislators. These bills seek to privatize the behavioral health system and would take away our local control and input around mental health services.

IV. Treasurer's Report

Tami

Our current bank balance is \$7,184.01. We have allocated \$2,700.00 for mini-IDAs. This results in a remaining balance of \$4,484.01.

Several Lenawee residents have taken Rent Smart! By attending this webinar offered by CAA, local residents are eligible for a \$50 stipend. These stipends will be appearing in next month's treasurer's report.

V. Ongoing Strategies

A. Blight Remediation

Everyone

1. What has happened since our last meeting?

- Clint met with Glenn Preston, Leslie Love, and additional members of the code enforcement team.
- De'Angelo shared information about the Blight Action Plan, Blight Elimination Initiative, and neighborhood revitalization. These are proposals that would help revitalize the community and rental properties without increasing gentrification.

2. What did we learn?

- We have the same goals as the City of Adrian! The City is doing a lot of work to remediate blight in the community and they're looking for different ways to partner with community organizations to support low-income residents with blight remediation.
- Leslie's position enable us to better track and mobilize around blight in the community. This will enable more thorough inspections with rental projects.
- The City of Adrian is exploring the possibility of setting up a program to offer low-interest micro loans to community members.
- De'Angelo shared examples of the power of community organizing to revitalize rental properties. These revitalizations resulted in ripple effects where other folks in the neighborhood started to increase maintenance on their own properties as they saw the neighborhood revitalization occurring.
- Community education is needed about the relationship between property maintenance and taxes (home values).
- Some landlords in the community don't actually live here, meaning rental payments are not coming back to the community.
- Volunteers are important! People power can be super helpful, and we need to come up with some sort of centralized volunteer structure to mobilize folks.
- If older adults are in need of assistance with a blight issue, either a homeowner or renter, they can contact Habitat for Humanity's repairs program or Habitat's micro-loan program.
- The Blight Elimination grant from MADC was not budgeted for this year. De'Angelo does know about a grant opportunity for Habitat to receive \$10,000 to rehab a property.

3. What are our next steps? Who will take them and by when?

- **At our March meeting, we will discuss creating a centralized proposal or structure for a volunteer blight remediation program.**
- **Leslie will continue speaking with folks about potential grant opportunities.**
- **De'Angelo will share the proposals mentioned above.**
- **Jackie will reach out to Joe Williams to see if the Community Foundation would like to be part of next month's conversation because the Community Foundation manages the Volunteer Lenawee program.**
